Teaching Drugs: Incorporating Drug Policy into Law School Curriculum, 2022–2023 Cannabis Curriculum Survey Update

I. INTRODUCTION

Americans' attitudes concerning cannabis have changed drastically in the past decades, with over two-thirds of adults in a 2022 Gallup survey supporting cannabis legalization. These shifting attitudes towards cannabis are reflected in the continued wave of states legalizing cannabis and in President Biden's recent call for a review of cannabis's classification as a Schedule I drug under the Controlled Substances Act. 3

Currently⁴, over 70% of the U.S. population lives in states that permit medical use or adult-use cannabis, and over 47% lives in states that permit adult-use cannabis.⁵ As a result, the U.S. cannabis industry is developing rapidly,⁶ and cannabis has become a tax revenue driver for many states.⁷ However, despite this growth of the U.S. cannabis industry and the complex web of regulations posed by states' legalization regimes, law schools have been relatively slow to add courses on cannabis law.

To better understand how law schools approach these issues, the Drug Enforcement and Policy Center initiated a long-term research project focused on an annual collection of curriculum information from all U.S. accredited law schools to identify what courses are being taught in the arena of drug law and policy, and specifically cannabis law and policy. The first survey was conducted in the fall of 2018, followed by updates conducted in 2019, 2020, 2021, and 2022. In the following pages, we report on results from all five law school curriculum surveys.

II. METHODOLOGY

We began by compiling a list of 2018 accredited law schools identified in the 2019 U.S. News and World Report Best Law Schools. The first survey, conducted between June and August 2018, involved online searches using search engines, each law school's website, and course catalogs using keywords "cannabis", "marijuana", and "drugs." When a course was identified through the simple keyword search, the researcher then made an effort to locate a written course description to be included in the overall database of courses and to verify that the topic of drug policy or law was included in the course. Samples of findings were cross-checked by other team members to ensure consistent results.

The second survey took place between June and August of 2019. Drawing on our experience from the previous year, we created a more robust methodology including additional search terms and contacting all individual law schools' registrar offices to give them an opportunity to confirm or correct information that was found in their online catalog. The search terms used during the second survey were as follows: "cannabis", "marijuana", "weed", "cannabiz", "opioid", "overdose", "drug induced", "drug-induced", "drugs", "war on drugs", "intoxicant" and "vice". Once we completed our online search, individual emails were sent to the generic email addresses of the law schools' registrar offices, as well as specific registrar personnel if their contact information was available online to confirm our findings for their school. Follow-up emails were sent in August 2019, and we continued to receive responses through mid-September 2019. The surveys in 2020, 2021, and 2022 duplicated the processes from 2019, but we expanded the collection period from mid-November 2022 to the end of March 2023 to maximize the availability of spring course schedules.

While we worked to identify as much information as possible concerning law school offerings, several issues and limitations may have affected the accuracy and completeness of our results. The first limitation is the lack of publicly accessible comprehensive curriculum information on individual law school websites. While each law school course catalog was searched individually, not all courses might be reflected in such lists, and not all sites had complete information available about all their offerings. Additionally, not all courses listed on school websites had detailed enough descriptions to identify whether drug policy and law were significantly covered in courses with generic names. This was especially true for the non-cannabis-related topics that might be covered in courses given general headings like advanced criminal law or health law. While we tried to address these two issues by reaching out to individual law schools, we did not receive responses from all of them thus leaving a possibility that some relevant courses could have been overlooked.

III. CANNABIS LAW COURSES

A. Cannabis course offerings year-to-year

While there has been significant momentum in states legalizing cannabis, the number of law schools offering cannabis law-centric courses has increased somewhat moderately, with 9 more courses being offered in the 2022/2023 academic year compared to the 2021/2022 academic year. In the 2018/2019 academic year, only 21 law schools out of the 201 accredited schools offered 24 cannabis-specific courses to their students. This number grew to 29 schools offering 33 courses in 2019/2020, 35 schools offering 35 courses in 2020/2021, 37 schools offering 38 courses in 2021/2022, and finally 45 schools offering 47 courses in 2022/2023, representing about 22% of all law schools offering cannabis courses in the past academic year.

A total of 70 law schools have offered cannabis courses at some point in the last five academic years. However, only eight of these schools have offered a cannabis course in all five years and 25 schools offered a cannabis course only once during this time period. In 2022/2023, 12 schools offered a cannabis course for the first time. Appendix A provides a detailed accounting of cannabis courses offered during the past four academic years.



B. Cannabis course offerings in adult-use and medical-use states

During the 2022/2023 academic year, there were 148 law schools located in states that have legalized cannabis for either medical or adult-use, with only 44⁹ (about 30%) offering courses on cannabis law and policy. In terms of law schools located in states with legalized adult-use cannabis, 33 of the 92 law schools offered courses on cannabis law (see Figure 1 and Table 2 below). For law schools located in medical-use-only states, only 11 out of 56 law schools (approximately 20%%) offered courses in cannabis law policy (see Figure 2 and Table 3 below). California, at nine, has the most law schools offering cannabis law courses followed by New York with six.

Based on the rapid growth of the U.S. cannabis industry, states' complex cannabis regulations, and the rising number of law firms looking to establish cannabis law practices, it is surprising that more law schools are not offering cannabis courses. This important curricular omission is likely to negatively impact the training of future legal professionals and may lead to a deficit in cannabis law practitioners.

Figure 2. Course offerings in states with medical-use-only cannabis regimes



Moreover, of the 21 states (plus the District of Columbia)¹⁰ that have legalized cannabis for adult-use, 9 states (and the District of Columbia) do not have any law schools offering cannabis law courses. Of the 38 states (plus the District of Columbia) that have legalized medical marijuana, 20 states (and the District of Columbia) had no law schools offering any courses on cannabis law in the 2022/2023 academic year. Put otherwise, more than half of states that have legalized either adult-use or medical marijuana have no law schools that offer courses on cannabis law.




Figure 3. Cannabis reform status and course offering in 2022/2023

C. Cannabis course offerings and school ranking

There are a variety of potential reasons why law schools do not offer courses on cannabis law. For instance, a school may lack faculty with expertise in the area or sufficient resources to add an extra elective course. In addition, some law schools may be influenced by the stigma associated with the historical treatment and perception of cannabis.

Nevertheless, it is worth considering the ranking of the law schools that offer cannabis law courses. During the 2022/2023 academic year, the four quadrants (1-49, 50-99, 100-146, and 147-192) had a relatively even distribution of cannabis courses, with a slightly greater proportion of top ten and top 20 schools offering cannabis

courses. In particular, three schools ranked in the top ten of all law schools offered a cannabis course, six schools in the top 20, and 11 schools in the top 50 offered courses on cannabis. Additionally, 14 schools ranked between 50-99, 12 schools ranked between 100-146, and 8 schools in the bottom 147-192 offered cannabis courses.

IV. CONCLUSION

When we first started tracking law school course offerings in the fall of 2018, 10 states and the District of Columbia had legalized cannabis for adult recreational use, and 33 states and the District of Columbia had legalized cannabis for medical use. Since then, the number has grown to 21 states with legalized adult use cannabis and 38 states with medical marijuana laws. Nearly half of the US population (47%) lives in states, where adult recreational use of cannabis is now legal. Over the same time period, we have also seen an increase in the number of law schools offering courses in cannabis law, from 21 in 2018/2019 academic year to 45 in the 2022/2023 academic year. Yet, more than half of states that have legalized either adult-use or medical marijuana have no law schools that offer courses on cannabis law. As the U.S. marijuana industry continues to grow, more law firms require lawyers well-versed in cannabis law and policy to help cannabis companies navigate complex and state-specific regulatory structures. The fact that a large number of states that have legalized some form of cannabis have no law schools offering such education continues to be troubling.
